Director's Note

My great-great grandfather immigrated to Kansas from Prussia in 1879 with a Mennonite congregation called Alexanderwohl. My father grew up in the same farmhouse they built, as will many more Nickel men to come. Though descended from the revolutionary, and nearly communist Anabaptists, this was a stagnant conservative upbringing.

I am incredibly grateful to have grown up amongst my Dad's new generation of Mennonites. The Mennonites who feed each other every Wednesday and house refugees in their basements. The barefoot ones that fight, and ask questions, and wash each others feet.

This new generation is grappling with pacifism, a keystone in the Anabaptist's faith. I despise violence, but I also know that 1 in 4 women are murdered by people who love them, and I have known those women. Now, pacifism feels like a habit of privilege that only my grandparents can afford.

Who were the Anabaptists?

Anabaptism - radical fringe Protestant movement that began in the 1500s

- Ana = "again" in Greek,
 Baptist → Re-Baptizer
- Radical Reformation small movement in the early 1500s focused on returning to the origins of the early church
 - Christianity was no longer focused on faith in Jesus but on participation in church

Core Beliefs

Adult Baptism

- Centered free will, personal freedom, and living truthfully in the entire religion
- A second baptism meant renouncing your first as an infant, and therefore renouncing the established church itself = blasphemy!
- Second baptism was punishable by death under some legal codes

Separation of Church and State

• Anabaptists were citizens of the kingdom of heaven, not of earth. Therefore, they weren't to be governed by any other laws than God's

Pacifism

 Thousands were tortured and killed because they refused to defend themselves

Martyrdom

• Often identified their suffering with the martyrs, confident they were living at the end of time, expecting the imminent return of Jesus Christ

History & Diaspora

Constantly on the move because they were being imprisoned, tortured, and killed for their beliefs

• The men were drowned and the women burned - referred to as their "Third Baptisms"

The Anabaptists who managed to escape West Europe mostly fled to Prussia where Germany, Russia, Poland, Slovakia, Lithuania, and the Czech Republic meet today

- Became farmers with an agreement of peace with Catherine the Great
- Led there by Menno Simon, a German Anabaptist leader, in the 1540s
- Renamed themselves Mennonites

In the late 19th century, as tensions in Europe built towards WWI, Prussia was overtaken by Russia, and the pacifist Mennonites were forced to enlist, and were forced to flee again. The Mennonites fled to the empty Kansas prairie because the land was closest to their former Prussian farmland. The US Government promised religious freedom, so they would be protected from forced military enlistment

A congregation of 475 Mennonites in Prussia, called Alexanderwohl, fled together to what is now Goessel, Kansas in 1873. They built a church under the same name of Alexanderwohl, speaking Plattdeutsch, Low German, until the villainization of the Germans during the World Wars.
